
Information for New Registrars /JMOs

Please read the website section on **Sutherland ED Ultrasound Guidelines** at the beginning of your term with us. This outlines the expectations of anyone using ultrasound in the ED, including saving images and minimum standards for documentation on EMR. It also specifies who can use the ultrasound machine and act upon their scans. We are keen to support you through the ED credentialing process in the following ways:

- Organising training on the ultrasound machines
- Recommending credentialed instructional courses
- Updating the US noticeboard with upcoming courses/workshops
- Supervising your scanning in the department
- Signing off scans for your logbook
- Running US workshops on teaching days

Dr Kirsty Short and Dr Anthony Van Assche are our FACEMs who currently hold the Certificate in Clinician Performed Ultrasound (CCPU). You can ask either of them to supervise you scanning, review a saved scan or perform a summative or formative assessment for credentialing purposes.

Google Sheets Logbook



A reminder that a user-friendly Google Sheets Logbook has been created to simplify logging your scans directly at the bedside. This allows you to create a tabulated electronic logbook that the ED US lead can access and update. When you are ready to submit your completed logbook for a CCPU module this can be done by sending an email request to the Clinical Lead in US. The link to the form can be found on the website and we suggest saving this to your bookmarks on your mobile device.
